


The Art of Living: Create Order Out of Chaos

Movie Nights take place at the home of Petawa high schooler Grace Griffin. Following pizza and the movie, the girls discuss issues raised in the movie, such as friendship, morality, or virtue. Girls are encouraged to come to their own conclusions about the movie or the topic at hand. The club helps teens look at messages in popular media and how to discuss deeper topics in healthy ways.

Last year the teens watched Remember the Titans, which raised the subject of friendship: finding, keeping, and being a good friend. The girls talked about a time they had either let down a friend or been let down themselves by a friend. The movie was a springboard to discussing friendship as a sincere gift of self. The conversation was especially animated when it came to the question of whether Jesus was fun to hang out with. The general consensus was yes!
